Our volunteers and staff did amazing as they carried out our mission to positively impact communities, build and empower people, and inspire innovation. We innovated through our newly formed TRF Camp Build committee. Some of those committee members received training and we started planning for our new venture, [TRF Camp Build](#). It is a coed construction day camp for middle schoolers to receive instruction from professionals in the industry while learning how to build safely. Hopefully, we inspire the next generation of builders through these camps.

We shared over \$550,000 to our communities bringing our total giving since launch up to over \$1.2M. When we started this nonprofit in the summer of 2020, in the midst of a global pandemic, we had no idea how much we would accomplish in such a short time. None of that would be possible without our amazing volunteers and donors.

The men and women of Rosendin Electric and Modular Power Solutions have volunteered their precious time, shared their incredible talents and ideas, and donated their treasures to help others. The Board and I look forward to welcoming more supporters into our community in 2023.

FOCUS AREAS

The Rosendin Foundation cares about the well-being of our communities by partnering with community-focused non-profit organizations to support health including emotional, nutritional, and occupational programs.



Emotional Health

Emotional health ensures that individuals have control over their thoughts, feelings, and behaviors. Industries, such as construction, place additional pressures on workers and their families as they are essential workers. The Rosendin Foundation understands that instilling a sense of connectedness helps people, especially in the construction industry, achieve positive emotional health. As workers and families face unprecedented levels of unemployment, concerns about respiratory health, exposure to COVID-19, loneliness and isolation, and coping with managing it all at once with limited outside assistance, emotional health and well-being are critical for surviving the next few years. We are committed to a Culture of Care, including suicide prevention.



Nutritional Health

Before the COVID pandemic, 1 in 6 Americans went hungry. In 2021, Feeding America projected 42 million people (1 in 8), including 13 million children (1 in 6), may experience food insecurity. Globally, the United National (UN) World Food Programme's live Hunger Map predicts 957 million people across 93 countries do not have enough to eat. Food scarcity, high unemployment, and other factors are depleting our food banks. Our local communities need additional assistance to overcome the food insecurity crisis, and that is where The Rosendin Foundation can provide support.



Occupational Health

Occupational health is dedicated to the well-being and safety of employees in the workplace, with a strong focus on injury prevention and employee education. The Rosendin Foundation seeks to ensure that the construction industry continues to work toward improved health with a commitment to injury prevention and employee education while prioritizing safety.

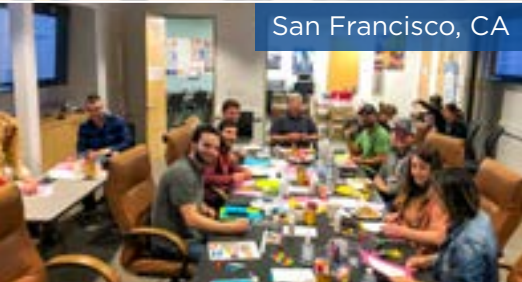

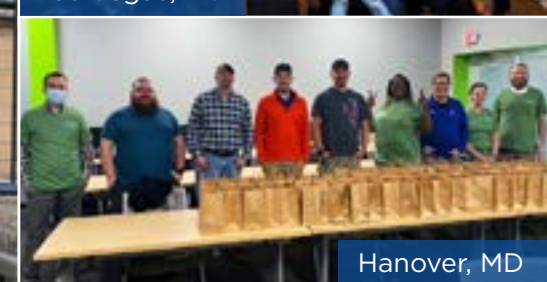

The **Fundraising Committee** planned and executed, with the assistance of staff, an amazing inaugural golf tournament and auction. The fundraiser sold out in 1.5 months and resulted in a net surplus of \$195,771.92 raised to support The Rosendin Foundation to carry out its mission.

WHO WE SUPPORT

The Board listened to the members of our community and heard that the impact needs to be significant. In its 2021 and 2022 strategic planning, the Board directed the Grant Making Committee to give out larger grants. In 2022, the Committee followed that recommendation and, for the first time, recommended grants in the amounts of \$50,000 and \$25,000. Still, it continued to listen and receive feedback from the local regions about how locally the community members wanted to see funds distributed under our 2020-2023 focus area of health: emotional, nutritional, and occupational.





ANNUAL GRANTS

In 2022, The Rosendin Foundation continued to grow its grant program by distributing \$535,000 in annual grants to nonprofits throughout The Rosendin Foundation's national reach. Since its inception in 2020, The Rosendin Foundation has distributed \$1,240,350 to 174 nonprofits.

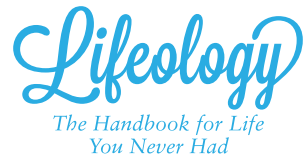
