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# MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

In 2024, we scaled our mission to positively impact communities across the country, build and empower people, and inspire innovation at an unprecedented level. We **shared** \$2.35M in grants—more than we shared in 2020-2023 combined!

Our service efforts this year included activating our Employee Disaster Supply Response Plan for Hurricane Beryl to support impacted community members, conducting 42 Service Days, and graduating 107 campers while expanding TRF Camp Build to include a returning camper program. We hit and surpassed our fundraising goals and celebrated those wins with our employees and nonprofit partners. By coming together, we used the power of the collective to advance our industry to new heights. What a way to execute our mission while living our core values and remaining laser-focused on our focus area, health – emotional, nutritional, and occupational! Thank you for entrusting me to lead our extraordinary staff and volunteers.

TRF Camp Build is our original programming executing on all parts of our vision. Participants are not the only ones who recognize that our innovative, thoughtful program provides transformative results. Communitas honored us with the 2024 Communitas Leadership Award, and we received the American Business Awards’ 2024 Gold Stevie Award for Best CSR (Corporate Social Responsibility) Experience.

This success would not be possible without our dedicated staff, committee members, volunteers, and sponsors. I am deeply grateful to everyone involved for helping us **innovate** the construction industry by making this impactful program a reality.

Our teams listened to our volunteers, donors, nonprofit partners, and community members to adjust and scale our impact. Thank you for sharing your ideas, support, concerns, comments, and enthusiasm!

Thank you to our Communications Committee that, under the leadership of Stacy Quilla, planned and organized 42 Service Days with 375 volunteers sharing their time and talents with our community partners, equating to 761 hours positively impacting our communities and supporting 31 nonprofits. Of the total number of volunteers, 94 were first-timers! One of our goals for 2025 is to increase that number and do even more in our communities.

Since we launched in 2020, our volunteers have collectively spent 4,829 hours giving back, and we continue building a community based on **caring** for one another.

The Grant Making Committee, led by Jeanne Donhiser, **listened** to our local communities and employees to allocate grant dollars where needed and created customized grants for each geographic area. Since 2020, we’ve distributed \$4,230,350 to 291 unique US nonprofits.

The Rosendin Foundation’s Golf Tournament Committee, led by Bill Blackwood and Hank Brasch, demonstrated how we **excel**. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual TRF Golf Tournament and Fundraiser achieved a 32% increase in funds raised over 2023. On behalf of The Rosendin Foundation, we are incredibly thankful to our Champion Annual Sponsors, DeWalt and Milwaukee Tool, and our tournament presenting sponsors, Border States and Sunbelt Rentals. Our industry partners show how they value supporting our community by investing in our work.

We would also like to send a special thank you to our 181 sustaining employee monthly donors who allowed us to capture Rosendin Holding’s matching funds. To date, we have raised \$1,573,719.93 outside Rosendin Holdings’ patronage.

Lastly, we believe in transparency and sharing our journey. We hope you learned something new from our monthly newsletters, social media posts, and YouTube videos. The Rosendin Foundation strives to share, engage, and educate our community so that together, we use our powers and privileges for the betterment of others. Thank you for accepting our invitation to participate and help our communities thrive. Please continue to share your feedback and ideas because it is only through active participation that we improve in the execution of our mission.

# COMMITTEES THAT CARE

## Communications Committee

# WHO WE SUPPORT

The Rosendin Foundation’s Board of Directors listened to our volunteers and committees and understood that the impact we make should be locally targeted and significant.

In the Foundation’s early strategic planning, the Board directed the Grant Making Committee to distribute large grants. In 2024, we increased

Emergency Grants to a \$5,000 cap and shared \$2.3M in Annual Grants. The committee customized the giving in each local area to meet the needs that donors and volunteers wanted to support and make the most impact through large and small grants. The grants distributed helped serve as an incubator for small nonprofits and partnership building.


In 2024, The Rosendin Foundation scaled our grant program by distributing \$2.3M in Annual Grants to 116 nonprofits throughout our national reach. Since our inception in 2020, The Rosendin Foundation has distributed \$4,230,350 to 291 nonprofits.

In 2024, we invited recipients to attend Granting Day events at Rosendin and MPS offices to share their stories and connect with other grant recipients and our donor/volunteer community. These events truly inspired everyone who attended. Given the success of these Granting Day events, we plan to continue to host them for the 2025 Annual Grant distribution.



**A Farm Less Ordinary**

**Sterling, VA** - A Farm Less Ordinary provides employment and a welcoming community to people with developmental and intellectual disabilities. This grant will support their Crew/Peer Leader training. Peer Leaders provide individualized guidance, ensuring that each participant receives the support needed to succeed in their role.

**Arizona Association for Foster & Adoptive Parents**

**Tempe, AZ** - The Arizona Association for Foster & Adoptive Parents (AZAFAP) is a nonprofit, statewide organization that serves families who adopt children and provide foster and kinship care. The funds these families receive from the state are minimal and do not cover all the children’s needs. This grant will allow AZAFAP to supply new shoes and jackets to every child registered in their program.

**Tempe, AZ** - Arizona Cancer Foundation for Children (ACFC) aims to improve the outcomes of children with cancer by reducing family stress and improving social determinants of health. This grant will help ACFC support 500 cancer warriors and their families.

**Tempe, AZ** - This grant will support Arizonians for Children’s visitation centers, which are safe, home-like environments for supervised family visitations and bonding activities, at no charge, for family reunification of children in the custody of the Department of Child Safety. **Ashley’s Place**

**Gallatin, TN** - Ashley’s Place is the only Child Advocacy Center serving Sumner County and receives, on average, 550 severe child abuse investigations annually, referred from Law Enforcement and Child Protective Services. This Funding helps Ashley’s Place deliver comprehensive, coordinated, child-focused services to victims of child sexual abuse, severe physical abuse, and/or witness to violence.

**\$50,000**

**Assistance League of Las Vegas**  
Las Vegas, NV - This grant supports Assistance League of Las Vegas’ Operation School Bell Services, which is available to students attending Title 1 designated elementary or middle schools. Each student receives a week’s worth of school clothing, shoes and a hygiene kit.



**\$30,000**

**ATLAST | La Tiendita**  
Lewisville, TX - Funding will help La Tiendita hire a store manager. La Tiendita’s primary mission is to increase the health and well-being of Latino youth in McKinney by tackling issues of food injustice holistically, ultimately addressing the root causes and inciting generational change. The store is located across the street from J.W. Webb Elementary, a Title 1 Elementary, where 90% of the students are minorities and on free or reduced lunch programs.



**\$25,000**

**AVANCE-Austin**  
Pflugerville, TX - This grant will allow more Latino/a families to join AVANCE’s two-generation family empowerment programs, which include culturally responsive mental health screenings and counseling services. AVANCE-Austin programs help families access opportunities and change the trajectory of their lives.



**\$10,000**

**BookSpring**  
Pflugerville, TX - These funds will support Books Beginning at Birth. Once enrolled, children receive free print books delivered directly to their homes twice a year until they turn five. Parents and caregivers receive periodic e-newsletters with tips on building reading habits at home, suggested activities for increasing motivation to read, and links to hundreds of free digital books. The program targets families in low-income areas across Texas.

**Boys & Girls Clubs of Annapolis & Anne Arundel County**  
Hanover, MD - The mission of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Annapolis & Anne Arundel County is to inspire and enable all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, responsible, and caring citizens. This grant supports their Street SMART Skills Mastery & Resilience Training.

**Boys & Girls Clubs of the Austin Area**  
Pflugerville, TX - These funds will support the Boys & Girls Clubs of Austin’s Physical and Mental Well-Being programs offered after school and during the summer. These programs address nutritional health, and physical activity and offer opportunities for recreational games. They also offer behavioral programs aimed at increasing positive outcomes for at-risk youth.

**Boys & Girls Clubs of Bend**  
Prineville, OR - Funding supports Boys & Girls Clubs of Bend’s Expressions of Empowerment: Fostering Youth Development and Social Emotional Growth program with one-on-one mentoring, small group sessions, and Life Skills groups. This program seeks to address many of the contributing factors to make a positive impact on the mental health of members and their families using a trauma-informed lens, allowing Club youth and their families to have opportunities that address their educational, physical, and social-emotional needs.







### Emergency Disaster Relief

In July 2024, The Rosendin Foundation deployed our Employee Disaster Relief Program for the first time in response to Hurricane Beryl. We bought supplies in accordance with our published plan to support 400 adults for 3 days and 40 babies for 7 days, with distribution first to impacted Rosendin employees. Supplies included food and critical products such as diapers, infant formula, and cleaning supplies.



# TRF CAMP BUILD

In 2024, we expanded TRF Camp Build, a first-of-its-kind national, hands-on, co-ed construction camp for middle and early high school-aged children. Campers learn from experienced construction professionals about the importance of building safely and are introduced to rewarding career opportunities in the construction industry. We added a returning camper curriculum in two cities, taking these campers' empowerment to the next level, similar to how apprenticeship works to build on the skills learned in the first-year program.

Campers learn through instructor-led hands-on projects such as electrical work by building and wiring lamps, masonry by creating steppingstones, and carpentry and painting by building doghouses or bookcases and step stools. We also donate the group project builds of doghouses and bookcases to local nonprofits, teaching the participants the importance of building for our communities. TRF Camp Build helps build and empower tomorrow's construction professionals, giving them confidence in their abilities to join the industry and in themselves.

## TRF Camp Build & Our Focus Areas




