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# A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends of the Foundation,

**Transformation is not only about change. It is about becoming more fully who we are meant to be.**

For The Rosendin Foundation, that truth shaped 2025. The year brought new leadership, a newly formed Board of Trustees, and a renewed focus on the future. Yet even as we evolved, the heart of our mission remained unchanged: to invest in the well-being of the communities where Rosendin employees live and work, to strengthen community health, and to introduce young people to futures they may not yet imagine through skills development at Camp Build.

In 2025, The Rosendin Foundation awarded **216 grants**, including **18 emergency grants**, investing nearly **\$2.5 million** across Rosendin Electric's national footprint. These grants supported organizations advancing emotional and mental health, nutritional health, and occupational safety—three essential pillars of strong, resilient communities. They also reflect something central to our industry: when people are healthier, safer, and better supported, communities are stronger and opportunity grows. Behind every grant is something deeper: a nonprofit strengthened, a need met, a life touched, and a community made more whole.

As we look ahead, we embrace our role as a trusted investor in our communities. That means continuing to uplift nonprofits of all sizes while broadening our capacity to support larger, more transformational efforts that create deeper and more lasting impact. With an expanded grant cap, we are increasing our ability to invest not only in immediate needs, but also in longer-term opportunities that can strengthen the systems communities rely on.

The last year was also one of building from within. We have been strengthening the foundation through thoughtful growth, stronger governance, operational excellence, and a commitment to partnerships and volunteerism that will allow us to serve with even greater impact in the years ahead. We are focused on being a strong partner in purpose across our nation—one that honors the trust placed in us by employee-owners, industry partners, nonprofits, and the communities we are privileged to serve.

Camp Build remains one of the clearest expressions of that commitment. More than a summer program, it is an investment in confidence, access, and possibility—giving middle school students hands-on experience with the skilled trades and helping them see that a meaningful future can be built with both their hands and their minds.

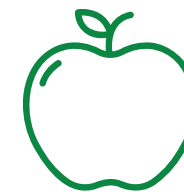
# FOCUS AREAS

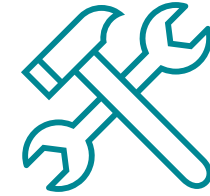

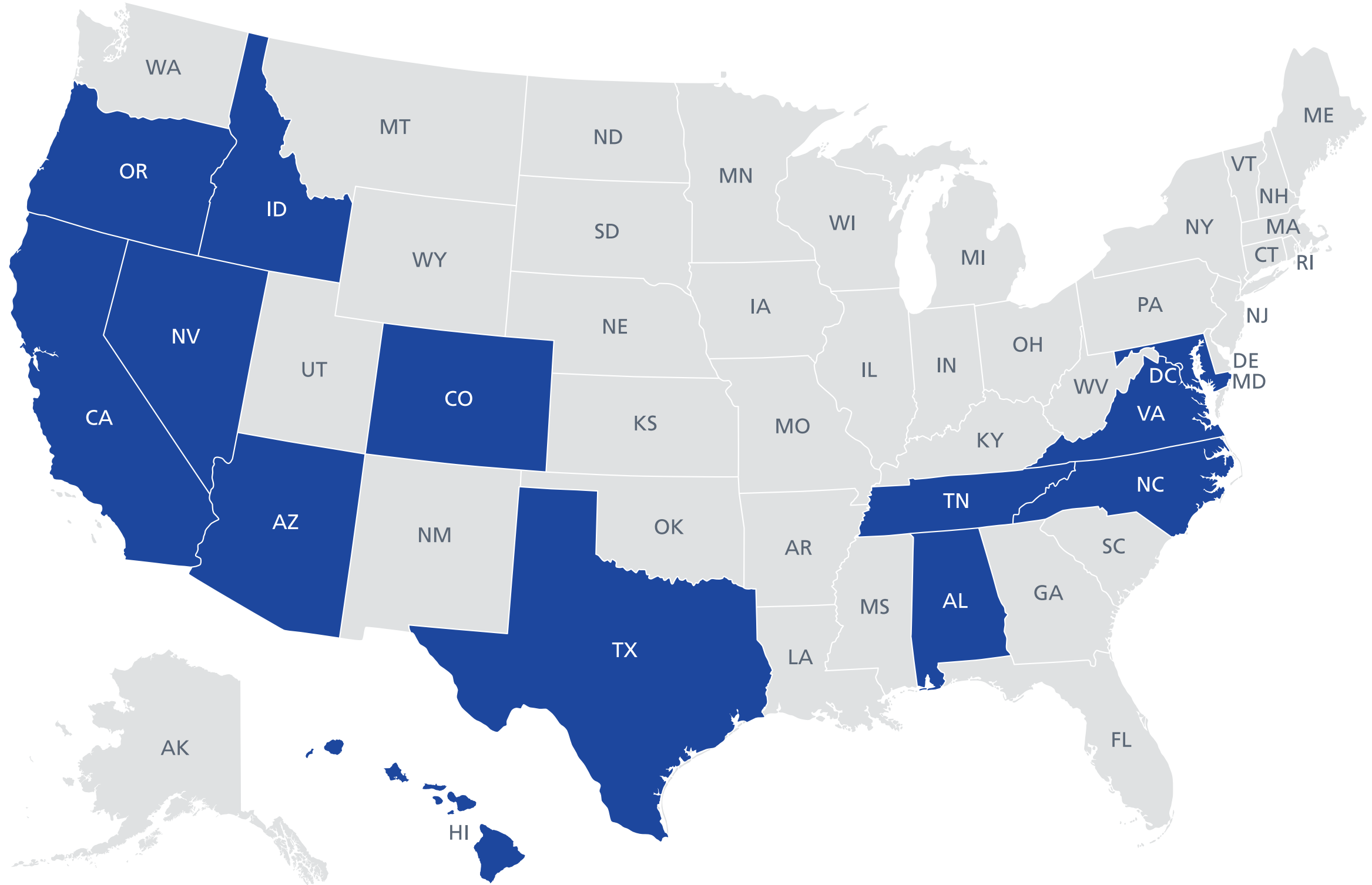

**CASA TERESA**

A Place to Begin Again

Casa Teresa provides pregnant women in crisis with a loving home to begin their healing journey—creating space for stability, restoration, and the possibility of a different future. Its mission is not only to meet immediate needs, but to help break cycles, transform women, and support families as they begin to thrive.

Before arriving at Casa Teresa, Jasmine’s life was marked by loss, instability, and painful isolation. She describes feeling alone, without direction, and caught in unhealthy cycles she could not break on her own. But in choosing to accept help, she also chose the possibility of something new.

At Casa Teresa, Jasmine found more than shelter. She found a home, a caring community, and the support to begin rebuilding her life, not only for herself, but for her baby. What began as refuge became renewal.

**“Casa Teresa has truly given me a home, a loving community, a sense of family, direction, and empowerment,” Jasmine shared. “It gave me a fresh new beginning. Not just for me but for my baby.”**

Today, Jasmine has moved into Transformation II, part of Casa Teresa’s residential continuum designed to help women continue building independence and stability.

Her journey reflects the quiet, powerful work happening every day across Casa Teresa’s campus in Orange, California.

The Rosendin Foundation is proud to support partners like Casa Teresa, where compassion is paired with action and healing is given room to grow. Because sometimes transformation begins in extraordinary ways—and sometimes it begins with something beautifully simple: a safe place, a steady hand, and the chance to begin again.

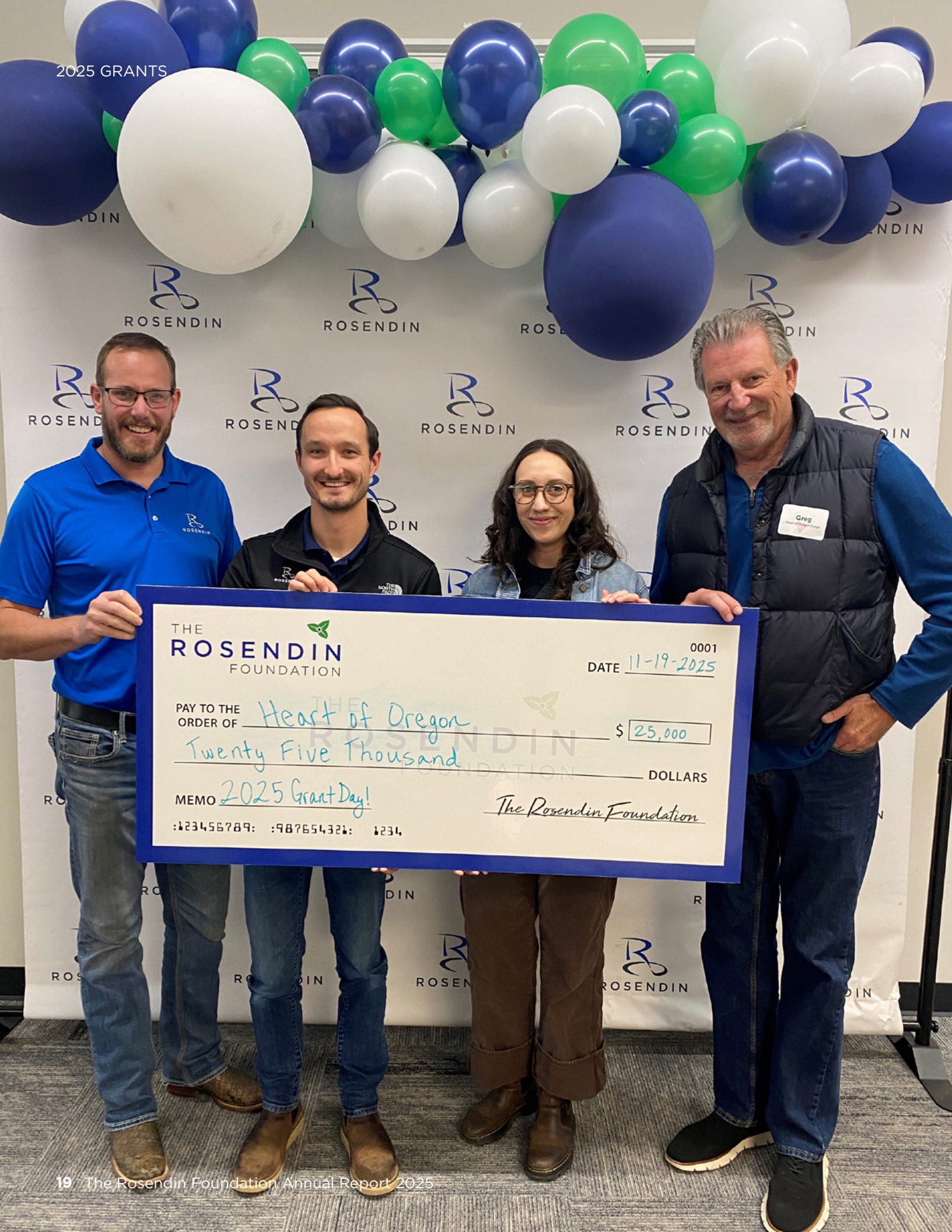

# OUR MISSION IN MOTION: HELP, NOT HANDCUFFS

Hope for Adults in Custody



At National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Clackamas County, healing begins with a simple but powerful belief: people facing emotional and mental health challenges deserve compassion, support, and a path forward.

**Through free education, peer-led programs, advocacy, and resource connection,** NAMI Clackamas works every day to improve the quality of life for individuals and families across the community. That mission is especially meaningful for people who have too often been met first by punishment instead of care—and it is the kind of work made stronger through partners united in a shared commitment to healing.

People with mental health issues are disproportionately engaged with the criminal legal system, as jails in particular have become short-term housing for people experiencing a mental health crisis.

Since early 2024, NAMI Clackamas has been providing a program called Blueprint for Wellness (BPW) for adults in custody at the Clackamas County Jail.

Beginning with a single one-hour class on mental health for a cohort of 10 adults in custody, BPW has since expanded to three

classes each week, along with a weekly peer support group. Participants are routinely paired with a Peer Support Specialist to assist in their post-release transition.

Thanks in part to funding from The Rosendin Foundation, NAMI Clackamas has also been able to launch both a women-only peer support group in the jail and a post-release peer support group.



The impact on the more than **800 adults in custody** who have participated in BPW classes and support groups has been substantial. NAMI Clackamas has seen a reduction in recidivism among individuals who had routinely reoffended prior to participating in BPW.

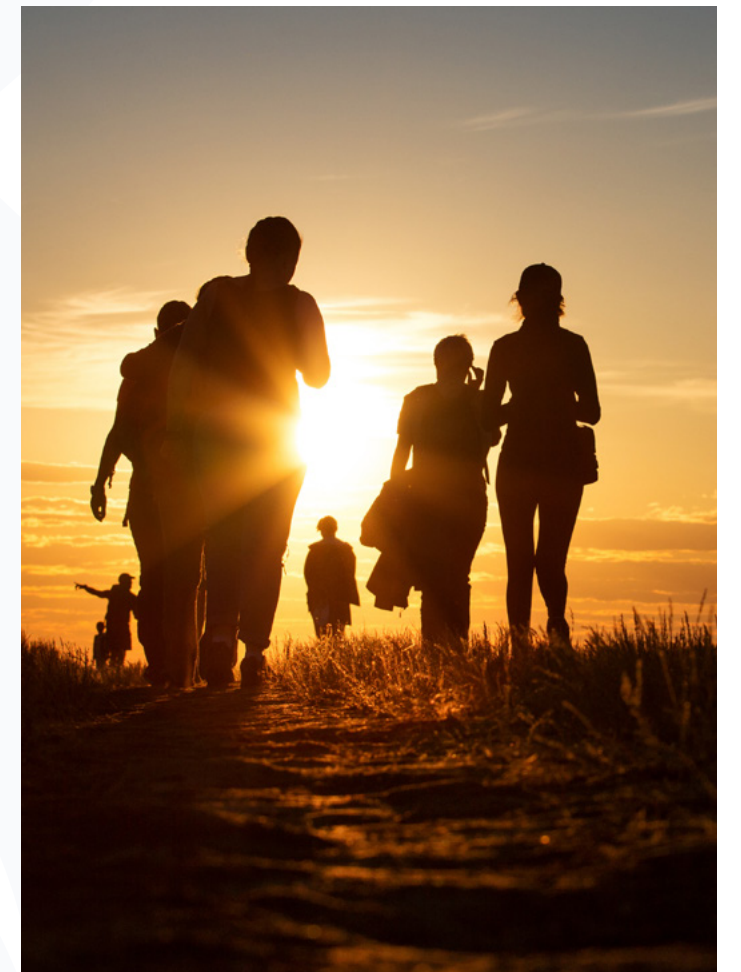
After several years in and out of jail and living on the streets with undiagnosed bipolar disorder, one such repeat offender is now safely in supported housing after completing BPW and working with one of NAMI Clackamas' Peer Support Specialists to secure a recovery team, housing, health insurance, and Social Security Disability Income.

According to Gary Marschke, Outreach & Development Manager for NAMI Clackamas:

**“This project has been a resounding success and is making a BIG difference in the lives of our underserved population, both in jail and after their release. We look forward to working with The Rosendin Foundation to continue to sustain and enhance services for our Adults in Custody.”**

In a system where too many people cycle through crisis without receiving the care they need, Blueprint for Wellness offers

something profoundly human: the chance to be seen, supported, and restored. Through this partnership, NAMI Clackamas and The Rosendin Foundation are helping extend that chance to hundreds of adults in custody—proving that when we invest in healing, we also invest in safer, stronger communities.

# ADDRESSING THE GAPS IN FOOD INSECURITY

A Chat With Dr. Megan Franco, Northern Virginia Food Rescue



## NORTHERN VIRGINIA FOOD RESCUE

The Rosendin Foundation supports nutritional health in the communities where our employees live and work. In 2025, we became a Partner in Purpose with Northern Virginia Food Rescue, whose mission is to improve food resiliency and accessibility through three pillars: food equity and access, food system resiliency, and community resources.

Since its inception, Northern Virginia Food Rescue has completed **51,707 rescues of 37,004,945 pounds of food**, equating to **30,837,434 meals for residents**. The organization has also helped prevent **59,097,203 metric tons of carbon dioxide** from entering the environment through their food rescue hero app.

We spoke with Executive Director Dr. Megan Franco about Northern Virginia Food Rescue's work on the ground and how the organization is helping address food insecurity across the region.

### You operate at the intersection of food waste and food insecurity. Where do you see the biggest gap affecting communities today?

Through this work, we've identified some of the most significant gaps in food insecurity. While the food supply is often abundant, access remains the greatest challenge. Transportation limitations, lack of cold storage, and inconsistent distribution infrastructure continue to prevent food from reaching underserved areas. Additionally, many smaller nonprofits lack the capacity to accept large or frequent donations, creating bottlenecks in the system.

In response, we established a regional Food Council, which is now chaired by our organization, to bring together stakeholders across sectors. This council allows us to coordinate efforts, share data, and collaboratively address the systemic barriers we have observed firsthand.



### So where does solving this problem start?

A rescued meal in our system begins with a food donor, such as a grocery store, distributor or restaurant, logging available surplus food into our platform. A volunteer then claims the rescue, picks up the food and delivers it directly to a vetted nonprofit partner, often within hours. That partner distributes the food the same day, or shortly after, to individuals and families.

The greatest value we create in this chain is speed and coordination. By minimizing the time between donation and distribution, we preserve food quality, reduce waste, and ensure that highly perishable, nutritious items such as produce and protein reach the community instead of landfills. Our technology and volunteer network are the critical link that transforms excess into access.

### You mention access as a barrier to food security. Are you seeing other factors come into play today?

In 2026, we are seeing food insecurity persist at elevated levels despite broader economic recovery. Rising costs of living, particularly housing and utilities, are forcing more families to make difficult trade-offs, often sacrificing food quality or quantity. We are also seeing increased demand among working families who may not qualify for traditional assistance but still struggle to afford basic needs. At the

same time, food donations are becoming less predictable because of shifts in supply chains and retail practices.

### How can communities help neighbors experiencing food insecurity?

Communities can play a vital role in addressing these challenges. Individuals can volunteer, advocate for policies that support food access and waste reduction, and support local nonprofits financially.

Businesses can commit to consistent donation practices and invest in infrastructure that makes food recovery easier. Local governments can strengthen partnerships, invest in cold storage and transportation solutions, and prioritize food access in planning efforts. Addressing food insecurity requires a coordinated, communitywide response, and we have seen that when communities come together, meaningful and lasting impact is possible.

Northern Virginia Food Rescue's work is a reminder that addressing hunger is not only about food, but about access, dignity and collective care. Through strong partnerships and a shared commitment to helping others, organizations can create lasting change. Together, we can help ensure more families receive the nourishment and support they need to thrive.

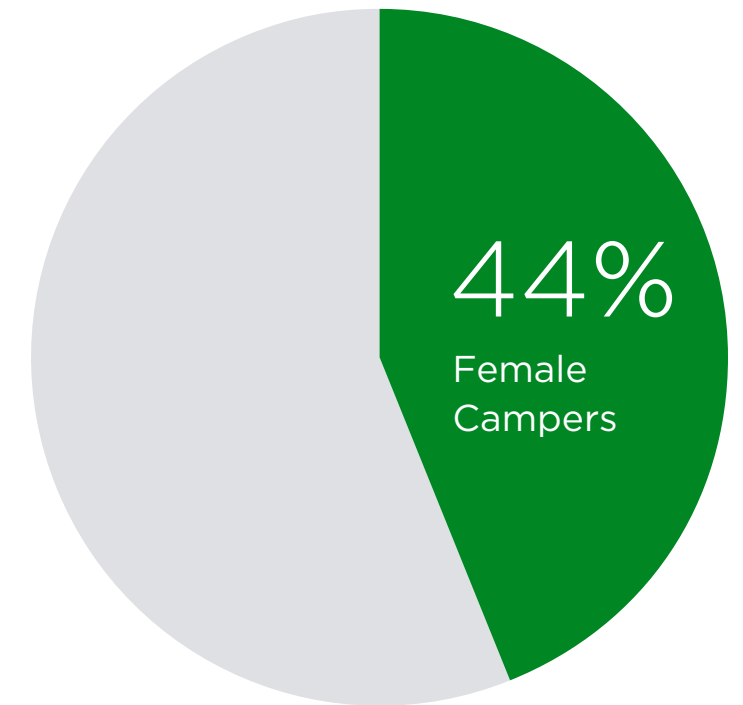

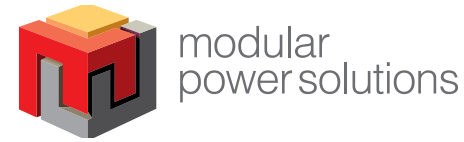
This robust female attendance serves as an encouraging spark for an industry where women currently make up just 11.3% of the overall workforce in the industry.
